From the Preacherman....

The toughest season to keep in the Christian year is Advent. Lent is not bad in the Northern Hemisphere. It comes along in wet, dreary February and helps us to walk in penitence to Holy Week and Easter, but the weather makes us feel that way anyhow, so it's fine. By the time Easter rolls around, it is warm and sunny outside and we are ready to celebrate resurrection. Pentecost and Ordinary time are fine in Spring and Summer, as are Christmas and Epiphany in Winter, bright lights in dark days.

However, Advent is a mess, completely out of touch with the time of year. The Christian season is slow and quiet and meditative, when all around us is a blizzard of activity and frenzied movement until Christmas comes and we drop, exhausted, at the finish line. That is all well and good, but Advent heralds something different, deeper and hopeful.

Advent reminds us to be still and know that God is God and we are not. The world seems crazy and insane, moving from catastrophe to mishap, but beneath the surface, deeper down at the heart of things, beats the heart of God, poured out in Jesus of Nazareth, punctured and broken for all humanity. God is with us! Do we know that heart beating at the center of things? We can know that God, but we know our own souls, and my heart, for one, is tired. I am weary of pandemic, weary of problems and pain and struggle. I need to connect with something bigger, better and hopeful, with the truth that death didn't end Jesus. Nothing did. But I cannot know that if life is too fast, too busy. I have to be still and know.

Advent is also less about the forced happiness of secular Christmas and more about the tears that come in the stillness. Do not miss the opportunity that is offered to us in this season. As I heard a preacher say one time, you have to take time for the pain. Advent invites that, beckoning us to just take some time, a little or a lot, for the pain of loss and death. Yes, Jesus is coming, but to face the end like we all face. Take time for the pain.

Because of the difficulty of preparation, some people just decide to minimize the whole season and get through it. I understand that, but would counsel otherwise. Go big, bold and brash. Ready the house and the heart. Christen the tree and the hearth, for Jesus is coming. Get ready for something new and amazing and astonishing. God is coming in the flesh, so we better be prepared.

Is it any wonder people find Advent to be odd and strange? I do. It is the strangest season of all. And I love it.
