From the Preacherman....



Long ago, when I was but a boy, my mother sent me off to Vacation Bible School at church one summer. Some ragged old snapshots remain (thanks Dylan), but so does a distinctive memory of a craft I made that week. Masterfully shaping popsicle sticks, glue and yarn, I formed a beautiful star, added some glitter, then a verse of Scripture: Be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted and forgiving, as God in heaven has forgiven you. (Ephesians 4:32). The exquisite craft is long gone, but the teaching remains.

Be kind. Both Hebrew and New Testament texts laud the teaching, as do other world religions. It forms the foundation of ethical behavior across our planet. Be kind. Often overlooked and dismissed as simplistic and naïve, we miss the profound depth and difficulty of this teaching. Too many people think that the whole point of life is to be right. They shout, louder and louder, until fists are thrown and shots fired. There are winners and there are losers and that's it, right?

We all think at some point that religious teaching must be more complicated, full of levels and practices and rules to keep. But what if that isn't the case? What if kindness is really the whole thing? What if kindness is the heart of the matter of God's gift of life to this universe, defining the life and ministry of Jesus in all its fullness? Being kind is costly. It got Jesus killed. He did not draw lines for grace and mercy, was profligate and wild with God's love and forgiveness, so religious and political leaders killed him for it. Being kind is very, very difficult.

"What I regret most in my life are failures of kindness" said George Saunders in a commencement address at Syracuse University in 2013. His speech is fantastic, but very simple. We regret those times when we failed to be kind to others. We remember times when people were kind to us. When we can set aside our fears, prejudices and selfishness and simply let the world breathe kindness in us and through us, life looks very different.

I remember a night of kindness, the night in 1996 when my mother died at home in Carlton, Georgia. I remember the progression of people late at night who came to see her. They were gone by midnight, but when she finally gave up the ghost and breathed her last, people started to return. By 4 a.m. the kitchen was filled with the smell of frying bacon and hot biscuits, scrambled eggs and apple butter. People returned in the face of death to love us. Kindness returned to an awful place. I will never forget that gift.

So, make your resolutions for the new year. Plan and dream big. Shoot for the moon. But maybe, in your day-to-day activities, just be kind. And see what happens.

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## DEVILS DELIVER

OHS defeats Pulaski 35-7 to win first state football title in 39 years

 LEXINGTON — It took nearly four decades for Owensboro High School to earn another state football championship.

OHS dropped Pulaski County 35-7 in the 2025 Kentucky High School Sports Medicine Class 5-A Football Finals on a chilly first Saturday of December.

It was the first time OHS won a state football title since 1886.

OHS had played in 14 state championship games from 2000 to 2020, and the fifth appearance produced a breakthrough for the Red Devils, who had never won a state football championship officially for the school.

Their started the season 0-2 then went on a 13-game winning streak to finish a dominating 5-A playoff run. OHS outscored its opponents 417-142.

OHS had looked like a team on a mission or much of the season, but this was a different kind of team. It was a team that stayed focused and on task after being beaten by two big losses.

"It was about our mindset, every week had a different theme of the week to keep us focused on the task at hand," OHS coach Palmarcus Ganaway said after the state championship in his first season with the team. "It was about us continually trying to find ways to find ways to get better, come together and play for each other."

"Our mindset was championship mindset. We've got to believe ourselves that we can
